What You Need to Know Before Showing Up by Julie Sternberg

The person who came up with the saying, "What you don't know can't hurt you," clearly didn't have officials in mind. It can, and it will. The more you know, the better things will go. In other words, you can't go wrong by preparing for your game. In fact, there are several things you need to know before you even arrive at the game site.

1. Know how to officiate the level you are working. Yes, you need to know the rules and mechanics before you arrive at the game site. Your pregame will help you keep the right mind-set, but you should be thinking about the level of action before you arrive.

2. Know whether or not you're going to have a game and when. Have you ever driven a long time

through traffic only to arrive at a game and then found out it was cancelled? What did you do? Blame the school? Complain to your assigner? Well, there is plenty of blame to go around and you're not without guilt.

3. Know where you are going. Know where you are going and how long it will take, so you know you will arrive well in advance of your game.

4. Know who your partner or partners will be. Contact your partners to verify the assignment, arrival time and responsibilities. When you know the individual or individuals you will be working with, you should prepare yourself for the best way to officiate the game with the partner(s).

5. Know you're going to have a pregame and postgame meeting. Know in your mind before you arrive that you are going to have a proper pregame. Prepare for it. Identify some of the keys you will discuss.

6. Know which teams are playing (and what that might mean). The philosophy of starting the game with a clean slate does not mean, "Strive for complete ignorance regarding the two teams". It is important to know which teams you will be officiating and to prepare ahead of time for that specific match-up.

That's a lot to know before you show up to your next game. If you're not prepared, start now.

Baseball: Conference, Behavior, Venues, Allocations

Defensive Conference

Q: Can a coach make a pitching change and then go out to second base and talk with other defensive players without being charged for a conference?

A: Yes. If the discussion with the second baseman occurs during the same time frame as the pitching change, the coach is not charged for the defensive conference.

Unsporting Behavior

Q: Can a coach or player

receive a postgame ejection in the parking lot?

A: No. Even though it is not an ejection, the umpire should submit a conduct report if a coach or player exhibits unsporting behavior in the parking lot. The WIAA staff will follow-up on the incident with appropriate school administrator.

Allocations - State Finals

Due to the fact that the 1B Finals only consist of the Championship game, the number of umpires assigned to the 1B, 2B Finals has been reduced from six to four.

Softball: Baserunning, Venues

Two Runners on Second

Situation: Bases are loaded with one out (Infield Fly in effect), batter hits infield fly to pitcher who drops it (no problem) runner from third tries to score and is not tagged, so she scores. Catcher sees two runners standing at second base, throws the ball to the pitcher who is in the circle. The runner from first and the runner who was at second are both standing on second base. The coaches are screaming at

them to do something.....one runner takes off for third after a good 15-20 seconds of pondering.

Ruling: The runner attempting to advance to third would be called out on the look-back rule.

Soccer: Goalkick, Venues

Goalkick Hits Referee

Play: Defender B3 takes a goalkick. The ball leaves the penalty area, hits the referee and rebounds toward the goal. B3 dives, touching the ball, but it goes in.

Ruling: The handling is the more serious of the two simultaneous offenses (the other is a second-touch

violation), so the restart is a penalty kick. There is no need for a red card for denying an obvious goal scoring opportunity, since a team cannot score against itself from a goalkick. If B3 does not touch the ball and it enters the goal, it would be a corner kick. If keeper B1 had taken the kick and touched the rebounded ball, it would

be an indirect free kick regardless if it enters the net.

Test Yourself: Baseball, Softball and Soccer

Each of the following includes a situation and at least two possible answers. Decide which answer or answers are correct for NFHS rules.

Baseball

When it comes to equipment, umpires must:

- Throw out a pitcher's glove if any batter complains.
- Do a thorough pregame bat and helmet check every game.
- Be vigilant when it comes to issues related to equipment, but there are no mandatory inspections.
- Umpires have no

responsibilities related to player equipment.

Softball

B1 checks her swing on a pitch that is called a ball. The catcher requests P to ask U1 about a possible attempt to strike at the ball.

- You are mandated by rule to go for help on a checked swing.
- While it is a good mechanics to go for help, you are not required to do so.

Soccer


A2 commits a cautionable foul 25 yards from goal. The

referee displays a yellow card to A2, quickly sets the wall and signals for the direct free kick to be taken, with A2 still on the field. The ball enters the goal.

- It is a valid goal, restart with a kickoff.
- The free kick must be re-taken after A2 departs the field and a substitute enters.
- While it was an infraction of the rules, allow team B the advantage, count the goal, have A2 step off the field and allow a substitute before the kickoff.
